Today is Gaudete Sunday: The Mass vestments are rose-coloured, a lighter colour that signifies the joy of passing the halfway point of Advent. The rose candle is also lit on the Advent wreath. The word gaudete is the Latin command 'rejoice!'. Advent is a sort of 'little Lent', but the Church says that we should be joyful on this day since the Lord is now very near.

First Holy Communion Presentation of the Gospel of St Matthew is today at the 11.30am Mass. Before Mass, parents should have the pamphlet and be familiar with it. Tick the register at the back on arrival.

[Always read through the scriptures prayerfully before Holy Mass].

Entrance Antiphon

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near.

Do not grumble against one another, brothers and sisters, so that you may not be judged; behold, the Judge is standing at the door. As an example of suffering and patience, brothers and sisters, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

Gospel Matthew 11:2-11

At that time: When John heard in prison about the deeds of the Christ, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or shall we look for another?'

And Jesus answered them, 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. And blessed is the one who is not offended by me.'

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds concerning John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? A man dressed in soft clothing? Behold, those who wear soft clothing are in kings' houses.

'What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is he of whom it is written,

"Behold, I send my messenger before your face,

who will prepare your way before you." Truly, I say to you, among those born of women there has arisen no one greater than John the Baptist. Yet the one who is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.'
