October Devotions: on Mondays Rosary, Litany of Loreto, reflection, Exposition and Benediction. There is a plenary indulgence for praying the Rosary in a church in October.

Indulgences: Even though sins are forgiven in confession, there is a 'temporal' punishment still due for them. This takes place in Purgatory. An 'indulgence' lessens this. Jesus told St Peter 'whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven. Whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven' (cf. Mt 18:18) The Pope is the successor of St Peter and so he uses this authority to attach indulgences to pious practices. To get the indulgence, as well as carrying out the particular pious act, there are certain 'usual conditions': 1. Pray for the Pope; 2. Be completely detached from sin; 3. Make a good confession shortly before or after and; 4. Receive Holy Communion worthily around the time of the pious act.

Cemetery Visit: from All Souls' Day to 8 November, there is a plenary indulgence for visiting a cemetery and praying for the dead there. The indulgence is granted together with the usual conditions of prayer for the Pope, detachment from sin, confession, and Holy Communion around the time of the visit. You can apply the indulgence to yourself or to the dead. There will be prayers at the cemetery after the 11.30am Mass on Sunday, November. Gather at the priests' circle. This year All Souls' will be marked on. 3 November since 2 November is a Sunday.

Outdoor Cemetery Candles will be available at the back of the church next weekend (£3) to place at graves. We will bless these on 2 November at the short prayer service in the Cemetery.

Pro-life Torchlight Procession to mark the anniversary of the 1967 Abortion Act takes place on Thursday, 30 October. Procession will leave John Street at Glasgow City Chambers at 6.30pm to St Andrew's Metropolitan Cathedral on Clyde Street. Rosary in the Cathedral at 7pm, followed by Mass at 7.30pm.

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY SACRED SCRIPTURE

Entrance Antiphon

To you I call; for you will surely heed me, O God; turn your ear to me; hear my words. Guard me as the apple of your eye; in the shadow of your wings protect me.

First Reading Exodus 17:8-13

In those days: Amalek came and fought with Israel at Rephidim. So, Moses said to Joshua, 'Choose for us men, and go out and fight with Amalek. Tomorrow I will stand on the top of the hill with the staff of God in my hand.' So, Joshua did as Moses told him, and fought with Amalek, while Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. Whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed, and whenever he lowered his hand, Amalek prevailed. But Moses' hands grew weary, so they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat on it, while Aaron and Hur held up his hands, one on one side, and the other on the other side. So, his hands were steady until the going down of the sun. And Joshua overwhelmed Amalek and his people with the sword.

At that time: Jesus told his disciples a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected man. And there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, "Give me justice against my adversary." For a while he refused, but afterwards he said to himself, "Though I neither fear God nor respect man, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will give her justice, so that she will not beat me down by her continual coming." And the Lord said, 'Hear what the unrighteous judge says. And will not God give justice to his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will give justice to them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?'
